# Addingham Environment Group Bird Report 2020


#### **Summary**


This is a review of the 2042 sightings of birds reported from in and around Addingham in 2020 (an increase compared with the 1035 reports in 2019). We had 83 different species reported including 8 new to Addingham species. There were 41 species reported from gardens including 10 gardens reporting a Sparrowhawk and 6 reporting a Great Spotted Woodpecker. Forty-one species were reported from along the River Wharfe including Grey Heron, Little Egret and Kingfisher. We also started walking regular monthly bird transects which will enable us to look at trends in species and abundance, in future years.

#### Overview

This is our third full year of recording the birds identified in and around Addingham. A list of bird species reported during 2020 can be seen in <u>Appendix 1</u>. An overview of where the species were reported can be seen in <u>Appendix 8</u>. The numbers of species reported each year has increased along with the number of reports received. On average we received 170 reported sightings each month during 2020. Thank you to the growing number of residents who contribute. (See Appendix 9)





Over the years we have had 90 different species reported; however, in each of the individual three years we have never had all 90 species reported. In 2020 we had six new species (first time reported in Addingham) see Table 1 and there were 7 species not reported during 2020 (Table 2)

#### Gardens

We had reports of 41 different species from 21 gardens and this is an increase from 38 species reported in 2019 (see <a href="Appendix 2">Appendix 2</a>). The Blue tit and Long-tailed tit were reported from the greatest number of gardens

(see Table 3), but interestingly the Nuthatch and Sparrowhawk, birds not usually thought of as garden birds, appear in the top ten. Although it is too early to see any trends in these data, Bullfinches, Blackcaps and Long-tailed tits were reported from more gardens this year than in previous years. On the other hand, Greenfinches reports have gone down. To enable us to monitor trends we encourage you to make regular recordings from your garden. Ideally once a month for 30-60 minutes (with a cup of coffee and a biscuit!) at approximately the same time of day. Record all the species you see. Same format as the RSPB Big Garden Bird Watch. We can provide recording forms if you

want or just send us an email each month with a list of species and number seen at any one time. It is important that you are specific about the species. If you are not sure don't report – ideally take a photo or send us a description. Don't forget to wash your feeder regularly to prevent the spread of infection.







#### **Becks and River Wharfe**

We are fortunate having several becks in and around the village. There were 29 different species reported from along and beside the becks (Appendix 3). This is fewer than the 37 species in 2019. Most reports in 2020 were from Town Beck – it is the longest beck that flows through the village and probably walked along the most frequently. However, we also had several reports from Back Beck and a couple from Marchup Ghyll (before it becomes Town Beck). Pairs of Grey wagtails were seen along Town Beck near Main Street and also near North Street. A kingfisher was reported from Marchup Ghyll, Back Beck and the Saw Mill Pond. As many of you already know the Saw Mill pond is frequented by Mallard ducks. We had a report of 45 all at one time!

We had 46 different bird species reported from along the River Wharfe (Appendix 4). The river and its banks provide a good environment for a wide range of birds both those associated with water but also for those that are at home in trees, bushes, and scrub. The Grey Heron, Goosander and Mandarin duck have been seen all along the river. A Little Egret was reported by several people during the year with locations ranging from below the suspension bridge to below Low Mill weir. Little Egrets were infrequently seen anywhere in the UK prior to 1989 so interesting that we have at least one resident. We also had a juvenile cormorant reported in November.





#### Potential Development / building sites

For the last 2 years we have recorded bird reports that come from areas around the village that were designated potential building sites as part of the Addingham Neighbourhood Development Plan. Although there were 16 original designated potential sites, we had limited reports from most of these sites. We did have a reasonable number of reports from 5 sites (<u>Appendix 5</u>). This shows a wide range of birds regularly found in South Field, Brogden Meadow and Newlands Field. Including regular sightings of one of the Barn owls in the old Ash Tree in Newlands field. Most people report seeing one Barn owl but there have been some reports of a second also being seen.

Curlews have been reported on 11 occasions from the South Field (Green Belt) area; important because of the national decline in curlews and who doesn't like to hear curlews calling.



#### **Selected Species Locations**

#### Owls

I'm sure most of us have heard owls hooting this winter. The hooting call most of us recognise as an owl is typical of the Tawny owl. The Little owls and Barn owls have a different calls. Although I've heard the Tawny owl hooting, I couldn't see it or tell where it was calling from, so I didn't add it to our records. Below is a list of where various AEG members have reported owls. In 2019 we put up two Barn owl boxes: one in a tree near Cat Steps and the second in another tree a couple of hundred metres north east of Cat Steps. Next time you are walking up there have a look. So far, no reported Barn owls inhabiting the boxes but 2021 might be a lucky year.

#### **Upland** waders

An important group of species that includes Curlews, Oystercatchers, Lapwings, Golden plovers and Snipe. We had no reports of Golden plovers or Snipe in 2020 but good sightings of the other three.

#### **Curlew** (Numenius arquata)

Nationally curlews are in decline, thought largely to be the result of loss of habitat (they like rough pastures and moorland bogs). We had 39 reports of curlews in and around Addingham. Mostly the birds were seen flying over fields. It is important we record where they land, feed and nest.

#### Oystercatcher (Haematopus ostralegus)

Oystercatchers are another upland wader that is in decline because of loss of habitat. We had 14 reports in 2020 which compares with only 8 reports in 2019.


#### Lapwings (Vanellus vanellus)

#### **Bird Transects**

A transect is a path / walk along which one counts and records occurrences of species. We have started some regular monthly bird transects to enable us, in future years, to look at trends in the number of species and their abundance. Many thanks to the small group (Malcolm Secrett, Lesley Loughlin and David Austin) who undertake Transect 1 and to Peter Miller for Transect 2 data. Over the year we have had reported 27 species from Transect 1 (see Appendix 6) and 27 species from Transect 2 (Appendix 7).


