That's right a Bumblebee.

Wildflower-rich grasslands are a really important habitat for bumblebees as they contain many nectar and pollen-rich plant species such Red clover, Yellow rattle and Bird's-foottrefoil for queen and worker bees, and Knapweed and Scabious for nectar. They can offer plenty of flowers to feed on at all the crucial times during the entire active phase of the bees' lifecycle (from March until October)

- When the queens are establishing nests
- When nests are growing
- When nests are producing new queens and males
- When queens are fattening up ready for hibernation.
